The May meeting of the Henry County Retired Teachers Association was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance, led by President Charlie Meyer. A welcome was extended to guests Ken Neuenschwander and Carole Wolfe, District 1 President (ORTA).

Mr. Latta will be in Napoleon later this week and she planned to take that opportunity to speak with him about this important issue.

Community Service Chair Tom Jenny reported the group amassed 1400 hours of volunteer service. He also referenced an article in the recent ORTA newsletter about volunteerism and how valuable our donated hours are to the community.

A email report was received from Jerri Osborn reporting the reinstatement of the dictionary project for third graders at Liberty Center. They had not been involved recently, but will be next year.

President Meyer relayed a note from Gene Grime about a proposed fund raiser, with volunteers being asked to bus tables at McDonald's to raise money. Details about this activity will be coming at a later date.

OLD BUSNESS:
As announced at the beginning of the meeting, the plant sale held at this May meeting will benefit the HCRTA Foundation. Many plants were available for purchase, thanks to Bonnie Eddy. Many members took advantage of this opportunity to purchase plants for their home gardens.

The Together We Make a Difference Project continues to be a success. Cash donations were accepted today for the purchase of diapers and at the July meeting razors and/or cash donations will be collected. President Meyer read a note to the group from Together We Make a Difference, thanking us for all of the donations collected during the past months. 3000 families are assisted through the Together We Make a Difference Project and HCRTA members have been faithful contributors to this effort. President Meyer also shared with the group an article that appeared in the recent ORTA newsletter about this project and our participation. We can be proud of our continued support of such a worthy project! NEW BUSINESS:
The July meeting will feature the recognition of the 2014 HCRTA Book Grant recipients. They will be our guests at that meeting.

Another item of new business was a discussion of taking photographs of each member for a photo directory. This would be especially helpful to the officers, as they could use such a directory to become more familiar with the membership as a whole. Discussion will continue on this issue.

Just prior to the adjournment of the business meeting, the 50-50 drawing for the day was held, with Tom Jenny being the lucky winner.

After the meeting, President Meyer introduced the guest speaker for the day, Ken Neuenschwander. He spoke to the group about plans for the Napoleon Civic Center, a project to preserve the John L Johnson Auditorium. A detailed drawing of the proposed building was on display, and Ken relayed some of the plans currently proposed for the site. A board of seven trustees oversee the project, which is estimated at this time to cost 2.1 million dollars. It is hoped that with volunteers giving of their time and materials, this cost may be reduced. The center would be home to the Henry County Arts Partnership, with The Maumee Valley Civic Theatre, Henry County Chorale, Henry County Historical Society, Henry County Arts Council, Napoleon Community Band and Napoleon Area Schools - all partners in the endeavor. It is hoped that the center could serve as a gathering place for many community groups, with meeting spaces, an art gallery and an outdoor amphitheater just some of the many plans for the project. A set of four new pistons and rings cost only $\$ 7.00$. For a labor charge of $\$ 20$ to $\$ 25.00$ you can have your motor and transmission completely overhauled. Parts are extra.

Informative \& Protective Services - Larry Vocke Tis the Season to Travel ... Be careful how you book your trips.
$3^{\text {rd }}$ Party online vendors are all the rage in travel bookings. Some are great companies with good deals but there are a lot of dubious "Johnny come lately" outfits out there. The oft-repeated adage"If it's too good to be true, then it probably isn't", is often spot-on.
Some of the bigger online companies that are dominating the market at the moment are Orbitz,
Tavelocity, Cheap Tickets, Kayak, Expedia, and Priceline. They have gotten very competitive and the service has improved since their rollouts.
Here is a website that reviews the online travel sites - http://online-travel-sites-

## review.toptenreviews.com/

Here is a composite list of issues that many travelers have ran into or didn't take the time to prepare for in their travelling experiences-1-"We have no record of your booking". Sometimes the 3 rd party vendor and the hotel didn't connect. Always check w/ the hotel ahead of time to see if you have a reservation.
2- You want a return or refund? Fat chance. Read the fine print.
3- We changed your travel date- and didn't tell you.
$3^{\text {rd }}$ party vendors sometimes fail to notify.
4- That rate you were quoted? We're upping it.
Read the fine print.
5- Not doing your homework - lots of review websites such as TripAdvisor, Google \& Yahoo reviews, Fodor's Travel, Yelp, etc. are out there to help you make your decisions.

6 - Believing everything travel writers say. Some are on the take.

7- Booking a "tentative" hotel room through a $3^{\text {rd }}$ party website. If you have to cancel, you may get a limited refund or none at all.
8 -Thinking a "Sell-off" $3^{\text {rd }}$ party room is the same as a regular room. They often are the least desirable rooms in the facility.
9 - Not considering a travel agent- they can often foresee where you may have pitfalls.
10- Not hiring a reputable tour guide if you are in a foreign country and want to explore.
11- Some room booking requests (i.e. non-smoking) are only preferences, but are not guaranteed.
12 - Not buying $3^{\text {rd }}$ party trip insurance. Do some homework on this, it may save you a lot of money.
13- It is not just the airlines that overbook, so do hotels. And the $3^{\text {rd }}$ party bookings often are the ones who get stiffed.
14- Adding complexity to cancellations is their specialty.

Airlines, hotels, resorts, cruise lines, excursions, entertainment \& sporting events all use $3^{\text {rd }}$ party vendors to fill out their available slots and vacancies. You can save a lot of money if you take the time to pay attention to the details; do your due diligence; and always double-check everything.

## Summertime - Bonnie Eddy

Summer is my favorite season of the year. Many daylilies are in bloom now and more will be blooming for several weeks. Do you know why they are called daylilies? Yes, the blooms last only one day. First thing I do in the morning is pick off all the dead blooms and put them in the compost. I picked over 200 this morning from our early bloomers Stella de Oro, Happy Returns, and Black Eyed Stella. The larger daylilies are now beginning to bloom. Guess why two of my favorites are Bonnie John Seton (large yellow) and Bonnie Boy (deep red). We have some other kinds of lilies that are now blooming, too Asiatic, Oriental, and Trumpet.

The over 100 tea roses we had for years are now gone and knockout roses have taken their place. We thought we had lost all our knockout roses because there were only dead stems this spring. Then green leaves appeared at ground level and new growth appeared. We quickly cut off the dead stems. They are in full bloom now and will continue blooming until fall freezing time. We have single red, double red, and pink knockouts. White ones have been added to the gardens this year.

John and I belong to the Black Swamp Hosta and Daylily Society (BSHDS) that meets at the Toledo Botanical Garden. The society has a perennial plant sale in May every year in Perrysburg. Because springtime was a couple of weeks later than usual this year, the hostas were not up at their usual time and I was worried we wouldn't have hostas to sell. I thought that the winter had killed them, and lo and behold they began to come up. We potted lots of hostas for the sale. Our hostas now look the best ever and are beginning to have stems of flowers. I've lost count of how many we have, so I just say 'lots.' Can you believe that my two favorite hostas are 'Bonnie' and 'John?' We were honored this year that the BSHDS yearly June members' garden tour was in three gardens in Napoleon and two gardens in Wood County. I'm still not sure how I became in charge.

We have some annuals planted - begonias, cannas, geraniums, Persian Shield, Star of Bethlehem and yellow daisies. Some had to be changed due to some animal(s) eating
them. Most of our flowers are perennials that bloom every year. I took a walk around the garden this morning and enjoyed those in bloom listed below.
